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# In the News

- Requiring new label warnings, FDA warns of uncontrolled pain, psychological distress & suicide from rapid opioid taper / discontinuation.
- CDC opposes using their guidelines to deny access or delay care for patients with cancer, cancer survivors or sickle cell crises.
- National Academy of Science released its workshop proceedings on: The Role of Nonpharmacological Approaches to Pain Management
- Among studies supported; PCORI funds \$2.7 million to compare acupuncture to massage therapy, for patients with severe cancer pain.
- Secondary analysis of 5 Million heroin-positive urine drug test found 39% of specimens had non-prescribed fentanyl present.
- Massachusetts, New York, Ohio and Kentucky are the four states <u>awarded \$350 million to cut opioid death</u> by 40% within three years.
- Doctors, pharmacists, nurse practitioners, dentists & other health professionals are charged with overprescribing opioid for cash or sex.
- FDA views CBD as a drug needing approval; stalling major retailers plan to sell non-THC cannabis products after hemp is legalized.
- Oregon delays controversial "taper to zero policy" for vulnerable Medicaid patients with fibromyalgia and possibly neck, back or spine pain.
- FDA public forums give voice to patients with chronic pain describing their experiences of treatments, access & medical abandonment.

- Glare P, Aubrey KR, Myles PS. <u>Transition from acute to chronic pain after surgery</u>. *Lancet.* 2019; 393:1537-1546. Review of the nature, prevalence, prognosis, mechanisms, predictors & potential biopsychosocial ways to prevent chronic postsurgical pain.
- Hamvik OR, Alford DP, Ryan CT, et al. NEJM Knowledge+ <u>Pain Management and Opioids A New Adaptive Learning Module</u>. N Engl J Med. 2019 Apr; 380:1576-1577. Development and background of <u>free online modules to train prescribers</u> in safe opioid prescribing.
- American Geriatrics Society 2019 <u>Updated AGS Beers Criteria</u> for Potentially Inappropriate Medication Use in Older Adults. J Am Geriatr Soc. 2019 Apr;67(4):674-694. Update based on 1,500 new studies support avoiding NSAIDs without gastroprotection, or with certain drugs/diseases; Avoid opioids with a risk of falling & in patients with gabapentinoids or benzodiazepines. Tramadol or SNRI's increases the risk of hyponatremia & should be used cautiously. Combinations of three or more CNS depressing drug classes should be avoided.
- Chua IS, Leiter RE, Brizzi KT, et al. US national trends in opioid-related hospitalizations among patients with cancer. JAMA Oncol. 2019 Apr;67(4):674-694. Six of 10,000 cancer patient hospitalizations are related to opioids, with only a slight rise in recent years.
- Hall KR, Stanley AY. Literature review: assessment of opioid-related sedation & the Pasero Opioid Sedation Scale. J Perianesth Nurs. 2019 Feb;34(1):132-42. POSS monitoring adult & pediatric post-op patients increases <u>awareness of serious opioid-related adverse events</u>.
- Zeng C, Dubreuil M, LaRochelle MR, et al. Association of tramadol with all-cause mortality among patients with osteoarthritis. JAMA. 2019 Mar 12;321(10):969-982. <u>Tramadol is associated with a higher rate of all-cause mortality</u> (including cardiovascular, GI & cancer) over the first year after it is started among older adults with arthritis compared with those prescribed nonsteroidal anti-inflammatory drugs.

- Griesler PC, Hu MC, Wall MM, et al. Nonmedical prescription opioid use by parents and adolescents in the US. *Pediatrics*. 2019;143(3). <u>Nonmedical prescription opioids use is more common in adolescents whose mothers engaged in nonmedical use</u> or had conflicts with parents. Protective factors include: parental monitoring, religiosity, school engagement, & adolescents believing drug use is risky.
- Buffington DE, Lozicki A, Alfieri T, et al. Understanding factors that contribute to the <u>disposal of unused opioid</u> medication. *J Pain Res.* 2019: 12 725–732. Only a third of patients with opioids prescribed in the prior two years disposed of them; education improves disposal rates.
- Ng SC, Habib AS, et al. High-dose versus low-dose local anesthetic for <u>transversus abdominis plane block post-Caesarean delivery</u> analgesia: a meta-analysis. Br J Anaesth. 2018;120:252-63. Low-dose TAP blocks work as well as high-dose blocks for Caesarean delivery.
- Chukwulebe SB, Kim HS, McCarthy DM, et al. Potentially inappropriate medication prescriptions for older adults with painful conditions and association with return emergency department visits. J Am Geriatr Soc. 2019 Apr;67(4):719-25. Older adults prescribed opioids for severe pain had fewer ED return visits within 9 days of discharge. Benzodiazepines for moderate pain were associated with more frequent returns.
- Gannon J, Atkinson JH, Chircop-Rollick T, et al. Telehealth therapy effects of nurses and mental health professionals from 2 randomized controlled trials for chronic back pain. *Clin J Pain*. 2019 Apr;35(4):295-303. Despite recruitment challenges; <u>telehealth-delivered CBT vs.</u> <u>Supportive Care treatment of chronic back pain</u> had comparable benefits when delivered by either a nurse or mental health professional.

- Meditation reverses the undesirable pain-induced loss of cortical cells in the brain, suggesting its role in pain treatment.
- How tapering opioids as a pain treatment differs from that of tapering a person with an opioid use disorder.

## **Complementary Integrative Health**

- Consumer-targeted self-help Virtual Reality applications to cut pain, anxiety and stress and are increasingly are available to the public.
- <u>Transcranial Magnetic and Direct Current Stimulation for headaches</u> may help different types, although practical questions remain.
- Either mindfulness-based stress reduction or cognitive-behavioral therapy help chronic pain patients; but which is better remains unclear.
- Although difficult to access, integrative therapies (e.g. acupuncture, imagery, meditation, music therapy, etc.) help children with pain.
- Mounting electroencephalography & pain assessment evidence shows either TENS or acupuncture helps patients with fibromyalgia.
