- Dr. Singh; HHS Chief Medical Officer on filling gaps or inconsistencies for managing pain through a personalized multimodal approach.
- New wave of <u>litigation against drug manufacturers</u> for their role as the proximate cause of the opioid crisis begins.
- William Bennett, the first U.S. drug czar explains that opioid overdose epidemic focus is misguided by concentrating on prescription drugs.
- Current state of opioid prescribing, addiction, and response in the United States frames key issue considerations to guide future actions.
- NPR explains how the brain shapes pain and links ouch with emotion from both a patient, clinician and research perspective.
- Keeping opioids away from people who abuse them is punishing those who need them; is resulting in <u>needless suffering of those with pain</u>.
- Latest stats show 90% opioid overdoses form elicit fentanyl in Massachusetts, while prescription opioid deaths continue to decline.
- National Center for Health Statistics shows opioid overdose death rates decline over 13% between 2016-2017.

- A feeding frenzy of lawsuits forces American Pain Society to consider filing for bankruptcy threatening advances in pain research & care.

- Dowell D, Haegerich T, Chou R. No shortcuts to safer opioid prescribing N Engl J Med. 2019 Apr [10.1056/NEJMp1904190] <u>CDC opioid prescribing guidelines authors describe its impact, good & bad</u>; including how related policies often go beyond, their recommendations.
- Cruz-Almeida Y, Fillingim RB, Riley JL, et al. Chronic pain is associated with a brain aging biomarker in community-dwelling older adults. *Pain*. 2019 May;160(5):1119-30. Chronic pain accelerates brain aging & may be slowed by education, physical exercise, and meditation.
- Groenewald CB, Giles M, Palermo TM. School absence associated with childhood pain in the United States. Clin J Pain. 2019 Jun;35(6):
 525-31 Pain is a leading reason for chronic school absenteeism and is an important metric to measure the effectiveness of pain treatments.
- Mees Bruin M, de Vries F, Dekkers O, et al. Opioid epidemic and related endocrine effects: a systematic review and meta-analysis. *J Endocr Soc.*, 2019 (3, Sup_1): SUN-489. Hypogonadism occurs with chronic opioid use by men & 19% of patients develop hypocortisolism.
- Donado C, Solodiuk J, Rangel SJ, et al. Patient- and Nurse-Controlled Analgesia: 22-Year Experience in a Pediatric Hospital. Hosp Pediatr. 2019 Feb;9(2):129-133. Pediatric and Nurse Controlled Analgesia is generally safe (1% have adverse effects) and commonly used. Estimated 5% of adverse effects are preventable suggesting quality improvements are needed to reduce risk of harm
- Rigoard P, Basu S, Desai M, et al. Multicolumn Spinal Cord Stimulation for predominant back pain in failed back surgery syndrome
 patients: a multicenter randomized controlled trial. *Pain*. 2019 Jun;160(6):1410-1420. <u>Spinal Cord Stimulation cuts pain</u>, <u>disability after</u>
 <u>failed back surgery</u> but only 14% had 50% less pain at 6 months post-op with 18% having adverse effects & 18% needing more surgery.

 Pain. 2019 Jan;160(1):246-256. Type or surgery, plus individual's pain & biopsychosocial factors linked to chronic pain after breast surgery.
- Allen KD, Somers T, Campbell L, et al. Pain coping skills training for African Americans with osteoarthritis. Pain. 2019 Jun;160(6):1297-1307.
 A tailored pain program for African Americans improved their confidence & use of coping skills to manage OA pain despite unchanged pain.
- Frey TM, Florin TA, Caruso M, et al. Effect of intranasal (IN) ketamine vs fentanyl on pain reduction for extremity injuries in children. *JAMA Pediatr.* 2019 Feb 1;173(2):140-146. IN ketamine had comparable pain relief as IN fentanyl with more ketamine side effects in the ED.
- Racine M, Jensen MP, Harth M, et al. <u>Operant learning versus energy conservation activity pacing</u> treatments in a sample of patients with
 fibromyalgia syndrome: a pilot randomized controlled trial. *J Pain*. 2019 Apr;20(4):420-439. Activity pacing that help patients overcome fearavoidance patterns may be better than formats that have patients listening to body signs to determine when to start or stop activities.
- Mallick-Searle T, St Marie B. Cannabinoids in Pain Treatment: An Overview. *Pain Manag Nurs*. 2019 Apr;20(2):107-112. As more patients use cannabinoids for pain, professionals needs to understand the side effects, interactions and proper initiation, cessation methods.

Complementary Integrative Health

- An anti-inflammatory dietary supplement reduced moderate chronic pain; improved vascular health & social activity in 2 months.
- Pain Management for People with Serious Illness at a time when scrutiny of opioid use creates stigma & limited access.
- Transcutaneous Electrical Nerve Stimulation 5 times within 24 hours of herniorrhaphy significantly lowered pain.
- Meta-analysis reveals mindfulness & cognitive-behavioral based therapies provide similar physical/emotional benefits for chronic pain.
- Music induced analgesia can work via cognitive, affective, &/or neurotransmitter responses that needs more research for clinical utility.
